10.30 WELCOMING CONCERT, Kaustinen Hall

Näppärit (FI)

Näppärit is an acclaimed Kaustinen-born educational praxis and philosophy that seeks to promote more equal distribution of the intangible benefits of music and music-making. Besides Kaustinen all-year group short courses and projects reach yearly thousands of children and youth in Finland and internationally.



Maija Kauhanen (FI)

Folk musician, singer-songwriter and kantele artist and prestigious Nordic Council Music Prize winner Maija Kauhanen is an explosively powerful and versatile one-woman orchestra who has rapidly built a formidable international career. Kauhanen's art is rooted in the Finnish Karelian tradition, encompassing its instruments, playing techniques, and singing styles.

El Pony Pisador (ES)

A leading band from Catalonia, El Pony Pisador draws on Celtic and Folk traditions with a substantial dose of contemporary energy and influence. They have toured internationally and released four albums, with the latest one consisting of 11 songs that capture the diversity of traditional Catalan music, blending it with new sounds and exploring themes ranging from medieval stories to humorous narratives and children's tales.

Tallari (FI)

Established in Kaustinen in1986 Tallari's repertoire covers a vast array of traditional songs and tunes especially from the Ostrobothnian region. Tallari collaborates annually with various experts from other traditions.

Paula Kettu (FI)

Versatile dance artist, dance teacher and programme producer of the Kaustinen Folk Music Festival, who will give a small local dance lesson to all the participants.

Aapintuvan pelimannit (FI)

Aapintuvan Pelimannit has been a great invisible influence of the Kaustinen Folk Music Festival for four decades - a community college group that has gathered together to play under the leadership of master player Mauno Järvelä since the 1980s. The group is open to all with no requirements of levels of skill and expertise but playing and collective performing develop rapidly.

Erkki Virkkala & likka Huntus (FI)

"We are two fiddle players from Kaustinen, playing others' music in our own way and our music in others' ways", say the mesmerizing and funny teenage duo Erkki and likka.

JunioriOttoset (FI)

JunioriOttoset is a folk dance group of 15 young people from the Kaustinen Youth Association, whose activities are focused on the joy of dance, self-development and performing. The group is accompanied by a local folk musicians group led by Antti J. Saari.

Tallari with Mehrnoosh Zolfaghari (IR/FI)

Mehrnoosh Zolfaghari is a Finland-based Iranian santoor player and composer specializing in Persian traditional and contemporary music. She merges ancient sounds with modern elements. Currently pursuing a second master's at the Sibelius Academy, she has performed at prestigious festivals and earned international recognition. This year Tallari has invited Mehrnoosh Zolfaghari to join them and create a dialogue between Persian and Finnish music.

20.30 CONCERT, Restaurant Pelimanni

Teho. (FI)

Tero Hyväluoma and Esko Järvelä of Teho. are a Finnish power-fiddle duo, exploding musical boundaries while having deep roots in the tradition. Their music combines fluently Nordic fiddling styles, jazzy influences and composed contemporary folk music with a touch of Finnish madness. Also members of the well-known Finnish folk band Frigg, they won the prestigious Konsta Jylhä Competition in 2016.



11.15 Keynote: UNESCO Inscriptions, Safeguarding ICH and Professional Folk Music

Kaustinen (Finland) and Nyckelharpa (Sweden) have both received a UNE-SCO inscription for Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH). The people who led the process describe how they went about it – and what it means for them and for the community and traditions to which it relates.

Matti Hakamäki, Director of the Finnish Folk Music Institute, led the UN-ESCO inscription for Kaustinen fiddle traditions. (See Page 3 Conference Team)

Esbjörn Hogsmark, co-founder of Sweden's Eric Sahlstrom Institute is a gold medallist performer and expert on the Nyckelharpa who led the UNE-SCO inscription process for the unique instrument.



How can education (formal or informal) work effectively with ICH? What do different organisations do in education for traditional arts; who are their students; how does education work preserve ICH; and are there any dangers in that preservation?

Vocalist **Annika Mylläri** is Head of the Music Pedagogy programme at Centria University and has extensive PhD and research interests in subjects including ICH, education and cultural appropriation.

Musician and experienced cultural professional **Fiona Dalgetty** is the Director of Scotland's Fèis Rois, providing opportunities for people of all ages to access Gaelic traditional music and cultural activities.

Vilma Timonen, from Sibelius Academy, is a researcher, educator, and musician specialising in traditional music and issues of intangible cultural heritage, social justice and sustainability.

As the folklore and folk music expert at Latvian National Culture Centre **Katrina Feldmane** runs the international folklore festival Baltica, Youth Ethnodays and manages the digital Aprika project.

Miklos Both, General Director of the Hungarian Heritage House, is a composer, performer, and ethnographer, with over 20 years of professional commitment, particularly in the realm of digitizing cultural heritage. His Polyphony digitalization project received the EU's European Citizen's Prize.

Jaana-Maria Jukkara, Director of Helsinki's Global Music Centre and Etnosoi! festival aims to increase understanding of the importance of music for communicating and strengthening identity.

Birgit Ellinghaus, Director of Germany's albaKULTUR, supports recording, promoting and touring global artists and is an advisory expert on global music cultures to Germany and UNESCO.
